COUNTRY WAYS - Butterflies

Its always nice when you learn new facts about the natural world, especially when they are wonderfully positive. This counteracts the constant negatives that we are forced to try and understand. Each day I pass a stand of thistles, they are growing on a strip of land that would not be considered garden. Thus they are prime candidates for a quick strim. This never happened and they grew and flowered. Here is the unexpected positive, they gave off a fantastic scent, it was strong and surpassed many of the garden plants we grow for colour and scent. I have seen many areas covered in thistles but never thought to sniff them. Thistles in agriculture usually are not tolerated, their wind blown seeds do exactly what they are meant to - spread. Chemicals remove thistles or if in smaller quantities a strimmer. In past times, when acreages were smaller the farmer use to walk his land, carrying a tool called a thistle stubber. This was a walking stick length tool with a substantial chisel shaped blade at one end and a ball shaped handle at the other. Its purpose is to cut the thistle root below the surface of the soil. I can vividly remember one small field, not much bigger than an acre, where the thistles were left. The farmer sometimes would put a cow and calf in it. It was never used for hay. Thistles in hay meadows is not such a good thing. Picking bales of hay up when they are full of thistles is painful and thistles take longer to dry then grass. This could make for dampness in the bales. Back to the small field. The amount of colour that field had was fantastic, I'm sure an artist somewhere managed to capture this. It was not only the vivid blue of the plant itself but the amount of life it attracted!

I remember there being thousands of small tortoiseshells, covering these thistles through out the flowering periods. Then came the thistle down and the plants would again be covered, but this time with flocks of linnets and chaffinches eating the thistle down. Sadly this is just a memory in an old chap, the field and farm became a housing estate and the butterflies and birds mentioned have become very rare. I pass the stand of thistles many times a day and haven't seen a butterfly, of any type, feeding on them!

There are still butterflies of course and my daughter took a picture of a beauty on a woodland walk. Good old dad names it before the AI driven magic thing on her phone. A white Admiral and a goodly find. There are places all over the country where some species are still in high numbers, the land being perfect for them. I seem to view a decline in numbers when they are just not showing up where they use to!


Having just read the July issue at my fathers today, I thought I would reply about the Country Ways article.

We have our own native hornet, which is large and noisy but harmless, and it is beautifully coloured. It is attracted to lights in the evening. The non native hornet, which will be on the notice by the church, is the Asian Hornet, or Yellow Legged Hornet, (YLH) which eats all pollinators. A nest of YLH will eat 11kg of insects, including honey bees. The YLH is known to hawk at beehives, to them it's like a supermarket is to us. Please let our native European Hornet go, and if you find the YLH, please keep, and report to the Non Native Species Secretariat. These are not dangerous either, but can be very defensive around their nest. If you think you see a nest, do not disturb it.

.Hooe & Ninfield Open Group

On Friday 13th July at Ninfield Methodist Hall 18 interested people. husbands included, gathered to listen to guest speaker Ken Brooks telling us about Burton St Leonards, the seaside resort for the gentry. James Burton, a London business man, instead of retiring at 67, he purchased 7,000 acres of land from Gensing Farm, (St Leonards) which included a small wooded valley leading down to the sea. Work on the plan started in early 1826. It included a house for himself (West Villa: now 57 Marina); service areas were provided, such as shops (Mercatoria) and laundering (Lavateria). The wooded valley proved too step for house building so he made it into a private garden for access only by the residents purchasing a key. St Leonard's was what James Burton called his plan as it was becoming widespread that to escape the smells and disease in crowded cities such as London, a spell in the sunshine and sea air was cheap medicine! He also included a North Gate for the turnpike from London to access his town, with another East Gate separating it from Hastings (although both areas spread along the coast to eventually meet. Ken told us about the Queen Victoria Hotel which started life as St Leonards Hotel but the name was changed when Queen Victoria came to the throne as she had stayed there with her mother the Duchess of Kent. His 10th son, Decimus carried on with the development of St Leonards but it was gradually absorbed into Hastings.

Our next meeting is on Friday 8th August at Ninfield Methodist Hall at 2.00p.m. Remember it is an open group and all are welcome. Hope to see you there. Nicki & Heather

HOOE HISTORY SOCIETY (2025-08-9)

There are two talks to tell you about in this issue. The first is by Peter Doodes on Thursday, 21st August entitled "Hooe, certainly not the everyday story of a country village". Hooe was once described as the,

'Rip van Winkle' village, when Hooe was actually a thrive of industry and innovation. From being a close spectator of the 1066 invasion, Hooe was an arm of the Cinque Ports, a place where there were salt pans, a place hit by a Tsunami, the location of a WW1 airfield, the haunt of smugglers, and an area dominated in WW2 by Radar masts. A place where a German Bomber crash landed (the imprisoned pilot later marrying a local girl) where a German Fighter pilot was killed when his parachute failed to

open after his aircraft was shot down by Peter Townsend, where there was a leather tannery and where a sports car was manufactured and where market gardens were the major employer. In addition, Hooe

was reputed to have been visited by Royalty. Certainly not an 'everyday country village'!

The second is another of our members, Matthew Chapman on Thursday, 18 th September entitled "The Snail and the Ginger Beer: the singular case of Donoghue v Stevenson". Matthew is a Barrister in full-time practice in London Chambers. He now specialises in civil work (predominantly, cross-border and jurisdictional matters). He was called to the Bar at Gray;s Inn in 1994 and took silk in 2017. He has a

longstanding interest in legal history (dating back to his undergraduate degree and, as a postgraduate, he was a student of Professor (Emeritus) Albert Kiralfy). The Snail and the Ginger Beer was first published in 2010 and tells the intriguing story of the most famous case to date in the field of civil wrongs (torts). The book and, indeed, the accompanying talk is intended to be of interest to a lay/general, as well as a legal, audience with an interest in history.

DID YOU KNOW...following on from last month when we read the recollections of Brian Pont during the war, here is the last snippet that gives us a little taste of what life was like during the last war. Brian recalls one particular episode that he witnessed as a pupil at Hooe school. It must have been about 1942 as he was to leave to go to Bexhill Grammar school the following year. There was a column of Churchill tanks running along the Top Road in the direction of Eastbourne, which seemed to him to go on all day. The tanks did not travel nose-to-tail and neither did they all avoid presenting an easy target for an airborne attack, returning to the road then three stay

on the road. Occasionally, when ordered to, they rode through hedges into the fields in order to try to at had passed. This tank convoy was preceded by a troop of soldiers, also marching past, in small groups of about 20–30 men, with gaps in between. This too was to avoid presenting an easy large target for enemy aircraft. These men were

probably Scots, as they were all wearing kilts. It is only speculation, but Brian thinks it is possible that some of these may have been part of the force that took part in the ill-fated Dieppe Raid that took place on the 19th August 1942. Although extremely valuable lessons were learned in the Raid on Dieppe, a steep price was paid. Over 6,050 infantry, predominantly Canadian, supported by 27 Churchill tanks, British troops, Commandos and American Rangers were put ashore from a naval force under the protection of RAF fighters. Of the 4,963 Canadians who embarked for the operation, only 2,210 returned to England, and many of these were wounded. There were 3,367 casualties in all, including 1,946 prisoners of war; 916 Canadians lost their lives. It was intended to test the German defences and gain information as to the feasibility of an invasion from the sea, but it was completed at heavy cost in terms of lives lost. It did, however, help in a big way the planning the D Day invasion that was to follow Peter Hayward

6th August Anniversary

81 years ago, on 6th June, the Allies mounted the largest seaborne invasion the world had seen. 4 years almost to the month that we had been kicked out of Europe at Dunkirk, we were back. The euphoria that swept the Country was dampened within a week when a strange sight and noise appeared in the skies over Southern England. Strange "robot planes" that seemed to be on fire and a noise like a motorcycle were starting to fly overhead, heading towards London. These were tiny aircraft, smaller than the Me109, but faster, at 400mph and at heights between 3 and 4,000 feet. This made it hard to spot except from behind when the flames from the pulse jet could be seen. But at 400 mph, that's more that 6 miles a minute,or a mile every 10 seconds. London is less than 60 miles from the South Coast, so that's a flight time of just 10 minutes! Not a lot of time to intercept and down the V-1. To counter it, aircraft such as the Tempest MkV with the most powerful aero engine, the Napier Sabre of some 2,400hp were stationed near the coast over the border in Kent on the marshes was chosen, although everyone lived in tents.

On 6th August 1944, 2 Tempests took off from Newchurch at 12.20 on patrol between Hastings and Beachy Head. F/Sgt Don Mackerras, RAAF in JN759 coded <u>JF@F</u> (a Series 1 having the rear section of a Typhoon fuselage, so the wing spar bolts protruded slightly and with the long barrelled Hispano 20mm cannon) spotted a V-1 over Bexhill and gave chase, according to the other Tempest pilot, P/O Dryland. He then spotted a V-1 further west so didn't see anything further.

What appears to have happened is that Don realised that firing on the V-1 could bring it down over either Hooe or Ninfield, or that missed bullets would then hit the villages and decided to wing tip the V-1 away from the villages beneath it. In doing so, he lost control and crash landed near Luxford House. Unfortunately, he died in his aircraft as it burst into flames and cannon shells set off by the heat fired across the road. At the time of his death, he was the highest scoring Australian pilot against the V-1 in just 11 weeks of the V-1 campaign.

How do I know all this? Partly my own research and also from contact with the Mackerras family. They brought Don's logbook with them when I met them in Ninfield recently. Like many families they knew little about the circumstances of Don's death, how and where etc, so we were able to swap information. Now I can't claim that Don "saved the village" as I can't locate a V-1 crash for 6th August in the village. One came down just short of Church Wood, but that was on 1st August just after the burial of Hugh Tait, who had been electrocuted when he and other boys tried to stop a runaway barrage balloon that had drifted over the Rec. There was another, in Hurst Wood which so damaged the Memorial Hall roof that the centre roof lights were replaced, even though the War Reparation payments didn't come through until the mid 1950's. But I don't know when that came down, but fits plausibly with it being tipped away from the village in one direction, whilst Don's plane crashed in the other direction, one east the other west of the village.

This meeting will be followed by our annual outing in September comprising a guided tour of historic Westham. Our archivist, John Cheshire, is running a free researching family history course on


