#### Dear Friends,

As we look into the months of July and August and to the promise of fine summer weather (maybe!), for many of us it is a time for a change of tempo. It is a time to slow down from the usual rush. A moment to forget those deadlines, targets, and the usual timetable.

A moment to put it all aside for at least a short while and as we take some time off for a holiday - either going away to somewhere different or maybe just staying at home and catching up on some much-needed sleep. It is a moment to rest.

Certainly, our work fixated, success focused, demand driven culture denies to many the sleep that they need. Research has shown that too many people nowadays do not sleep long enough or well enough so as to be at their best. I know for myself that as I get older I seem to need more sleep and that without it I quickly become irritable and impatient. I have lost count of the many times I have woken up and try desperately to get back to sleep. That need for proper rest is built into us, made as we all are in the image of God. In three days, says the Book of Genesis, God had formed the world. Then, in three parallel days he wonderfully filled it with the light of the sun and moon and stars and with the trees and plants and creatures of the deep, with the birds of the sky and all the animals that roamed across the earth. The apex of his work was the creation of humankind and:

"God looked over all he had made, and he saw that it was very good!"
But then, having finished his work of creation, he rested. On the seventh day
he rested from all his work.

That rest would not have included sleep. As the psalmist says when speaking of God's great care for us: the one who watches over you will not slumber. Indeed, he who watches over Israel never slumbers or sleeps (Psalm 121: 3-4, which is a reminder that God not only made the hills, the heavens, and the earth but he also watches over us, never diverted nor distracted. We can never outgrow our need for God's untiring watch over our lives. But that 'watch,' that care and provision of us, includes God's recognition of our need for rest. So, our need to take a moment of rest, a day of rest in biblical terms, became a commandment.

Jesus himself demonstrated our need for rest and our need for sleep. In Mark's Gospel we're told how he took his disciples away to rest after they had completed the work he'd given them to do (Mark6: 31). And in Luke's Gospel we read how Jesus slept even as a

storm raged around the boat on which he and his disciples were travelling (Luke 8: 23ff). It calls to my mind some other words that we read in the

psalms: God gives sleep to his loved ones (Psalm127: 2). So, rest and sleep are God given gifts. But they are more.

They are moments to let go and to remind ourselves that God is in control. I hope and pray that you will all know something of that rest (and a chance to catch up on some quality sleep!) over the Summer and that whatever you are doing, it will be a time of real blessing, peace, and relaxation. But don't leave it at just that few days or

couple of weeks. Remember that our need to rest 'a day each week' is built into us and indeed that not only can we rest on one day of the week, but we are invited to rest in Jesus every day, at any time: Come to me, all of you who are weary and carry heavy burdens, and I will give you rest (Matthew 11: 28)

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#### **News from St Oswald's**

We are pleased to report that the Notices are now up regarding the Planning application to Wealden DC to build an Accessible toilet and Kitchen extension on the north side of the Church. Notices will be displayed until 19<sup>th</sup> June. The Planning department will then make recommendations to the Council with a decision to be released on 9<sup>th</sup> July 2025. If Wealden do grant permission to go ahead, we are hopeful, that the Diocese, will also be in favour and grant us a Faculty to commence the work. We can then begin to apply for grants to help with funding and put the Contract out to Tender. We will then have a real sense of the costs. Fundraising can begin!

The old brick shed has been refurbished to create extra storage.

Some unexpected news that we would like to share, came to us quite by chance. Whilst we were doing various jobs at the church, we had a visit from the Animal and Plant Health Agency. They had set up a "hornet" trap in the churchyard in April and have been monitoring and recording the hornet life in and around the church. On their visit on 29<sup>th</sup> May, they found 4 European Hornets, which was good as they appear to be harmless to the other wildlife in the locality. However, they are also looking out for the "yellow legged" (Asian) hornet. These are causing a problem as they attack and eat our native bees. The contact details needed to report any sightings are on a number of noticeboards around the village with photos.

Many of you who visit the church regularly, will be aware of the bees that appear each year in late spring early summer. We were able to ask the representatives from the Animal and Plant Health Agency for their advice regarding the bee visits. The advice is to let them be. They do not cause us any problem during church services. They will probably reduce in numbers, which is what we have noticed and may well disappear. The likelihood is, that the east wall cavity is their inaccessible hive, which may well be raided by a moth, who eats the comb and then they retreat. However, the lasting scent of the honey may well attract future populations of new bees. The cycle will probably then restart. It is distressing to see and clear up so many dead bees but it is a natural problem that we at church live with and have no control over.

#### **COUNTRY WAYS** War Graves and Hornets

Lets start with Hornets, the less contentious of the two. Before I arrived here I had never seen a hornet, let alone had to defend my home from them.

I tend to hear them first, a drowning sound similar to a small helicopter. Time then to go on the defensive. Once located a sharp rap with the shooting times solves the problem. This is an odd stance from me as bee's and wasps are treated differently. Bee's I always let out and only when they just don't understand that they can just fly away I catch them in a jam jar and then let them go. During the summer I do the same for wasps, its only come September when their hive is declining, I tend to resort to the shooting times with wasps. Hornet though are a different matter, they look aggressive and dangerous which they are, I assume.

So walking the dog today I read a poster pinned to the Church. It seemed to want us to identify the different kinds of Hornet. I shall take my reading glasses next time to see exactly what it said. Identifying the remnants of a full blown defensive action is not really possible. Due to some concern over antagonising the beast, the strike is somewhat excessive. I will do some research and try to find out just how dangerous hornets are and if a blow is required, then to check exactly who I'm swatting.

I was listening to a conservation yesterday about war graves and how they should be kept. We have two war graves at the Church as as far as I remember they were washed on the spring clean up. They are in a sensitive area of the Church yard where we are trying to increase the biodiversity of the site. There are many grave stones that are no longer tended by family, they also are part of our biodiversity plan. Graves that are tended by family are not fitted into the plan.

Back in Lincolnshire the Armistice Day was marked with a march past by local groups. Some schools were represented as were the Scouts and Brownies. The Cadet forces marched as did the veterans. All branches of the military were represented but there were a large number of Guards Men. This regiment my son joined, it was then Queens company Grenadier Guards. I watched with pride as he marched as a cadet and then in full uniform, as leave permitted, as a Grenadier. The old Guard were diminishing then, those old boys who served their country in the last war will be just about be all gone. Their funerals I attended were special, the remaining old Guards turned out as if on parade. My son lined the entrance to the Church with these men, twice. My Son having served in both Iraq and Afghanistan there were many, many more sad occasions to be honoured.

John and Big Ted both lie under a normal head stone, their landing on the

beaches of D Day forgotten except for their friends and family. My son, six foot four and built like an iron bar, is wrecked and living on a war pension. Our war dead, I prey, are at peace. So perhaps I will take my scythe down to the two war graves we have, not a strimmer, and tidy their plots quietly. Then not so quietly point out that our broken and unwanted soldiers need our help and respect now as well.

N.B. Just checked the war graves and they abut normal graves with a side border in stone. No chance to scythe then so it's the strimmer! AT

### Hooe & Ninfield Open Group

On Friday 13th June at Ninfield Methodist Hall 16 interested people, husbands included, gathered to listen to guest speaker Alan Tipping describe his time as a game keeper in Norfolk. His main focus was to breed Pheasants and Partridges for the owner of the estate where he worked. He gave us a history of the guns used in the shooting of these birds and the history of the large estates where anyone caught for poaching whether it be pigeons or rabbits could have their hands or fingers chopped off or even put to death. He explained how the birds were bred It was fascinating to learn about unusual behaviour of pheasants and partridges, for example, how they need enclosures that are circular, otherwise when they find themselves in a corner they feel trapped, panic and die, accompanied by as many of their fellow birds that followed them and get "stuck" not knowing how to reverse!

An hour quickly passed then it was time for the usual tea and biscuits.

#### NINFIELD VILLAGE SOCIETY

Recent warm then wet weather has lead to an explosion of growth in Church Wood with brambles and nettles encroaching on pathways and a riot of seasonal colour throughout. The volunteers now number eight or nine most weeks so we have had the opportunity of splitting into teams to attend to strimming, mowing and planting of new saplings. We have had to clear timber thrown into the ponds but fortunately can recall what we were like when young so mostly it is taken in good spirit! In addition we have been able to use the wood chipper to good effect and regular visitors will notice that we have now covered further pathways with a top dressing generated from the waste on site. On the rare occasions we have to fell a tree it is quite incredible how much spoil there is at the top of a mature chestnut or similar which we can now convert into the wood chipping we need. Other jobs around the village have included the clearance of upper Church Path where again the brambles were taking over.

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#### HOOE HISTORY SOCIETY

This month we are joining in a behind the scenes guided tour of the De la Warr pavilion on the morning of Thursday the 17<sup>th</sup> July. There will therefore be no meeting in the evening.

DID YOU KNOW...following on from last month when we read the recollections of Brian Pont during the war, here are a few more of his thoughts.

Brian recalls there were very many 3.8 and 4.5 inch anti-aircraft guns situated along the coast between Eastbourne and Hastings, as the first line of defence towards the end of the war, against the Doodlebugs. Many of these had been relocated from London in order to try to intercept the raiders early. The guns set up in the fields around Hooe were part of the second line of defence – and this was repeated across the South-East. All of these guns were pointed south and east, towards the continent, so as not to risk shooting down what was the third line of defence. This was the RAF and allied aircraft pilots, who would use cannon to shoot the Doodlebugs down or nudge them with their wingtips to alter their course or send them crashing to the ground away from areas of dense population.

In 1940 there was also a 16-inch gun set up in a field at the rear of the Lamb Inn at Wartling, with unobstructed views right across the Pevensey Levels to the coast. He believes they may have used the Martello towers as range finders in practice rounds. There was also a radar installation situated on the marsh just to the west of Wartling. His father told him of Stuka's dive-bombing pylons and other strategic targets in this area. The Stuka was fitted with a siren which was activated, when opened, by wind blowing through it as they dived on their target. It made a fearsome sound as it attacked its target.

Early in the war, before the Battle of Britain, when a German Messerschmitt 110 was brought down on the marsh behind School Farm, Keith Smythe (who owned and farmed Sandhall Farm close by) was quickly on the scene and, as a member of the Home Guard, he carried a pistol and rushed the crash site to prevent the crew from destroying the plane. It was also, at the time, illegal to remove "trophies" from downed enemy aircraft as they carried potentially useful information that could be used in the war effort.

Brian remembers seeing two doodlebugs brought down by planes over the village towards the end of the war. For the first one, he was riding his bicycle and stopped at the top of Sadlers Hill when he saw a P-51 Mustang fighter aeroplane approach the doodlebug and gently tip it with his wing. It flipped over and fell rapidly somewhere in the direction of Wet Wood (the wood behind Sandhall and Tanyard, running up towards Moor Hall). He saw the second from the gun field behind Broad Green Farm. This doodlebug was

shot at by a Spitfire with .303 exploding bullets and detonated in the air. He felt the blast of the explosion where he stood on the ground and saw the remains of the missile fall gently to the ground.

Quite often the German bombers would release any remaining bombs on their way back to base from the London raids. There were several examples of this type of indiscriminate bombing around the village of Hooe. A "string" of bombs fell in the area of Nut Brown Farm, one of them destroying a shed where Charles "Chollie" Freeman lived. Another "string" of bombs was dropped close to Court Lodge in about 1942. Other local places to suffer indiscriminate hits were at Russells Green where a bomb fell where the post box now stands and another hit and destroyed Cecil Lade's house close by; another damaged the Wesleyan Chapel (opposite Martin's Farm entrance) so badly that it had to be demolished; one fell in the area of Hope Cottage (where the Farm Shop is now) destroying an outbuilding; and another fell close to Akehurst Farm, but without causing too much damage. Interestingly, one fell close by Hope Cottage where Gordon and Edna Pont lived with their family, but it did not explode and needed to be defused. As a result, Gordon and Edna moved to "Hollybank" at Lower Street. Ninfield until well after the war had finished.
